- **Pastor's Report**—pastoral care—Gay wonders if the Congregation is aware that she is not able to provide this service with her other responsibilities. Suggests we put a blurb in the newsletter letting people know who to contact with concerns.
- Gay also shared her concern that we don't have a complete Master Church calendar with details. Clarissa suggested setting up a Google doc so everyone could add to it and edit. There was some push back from those less comfortable with the technology.

Pastor Nominating Committee Report – Clarissa indicated the team is not where they hoped they'd be. We discussed extending Gay's contract through March. Gay agreed she could commit to us for that time period.

COVID Situation Assessment Report – The Team has made no changes.

Area & Team Reports

Administration -

- Lynn's planned absence, January 26-February 7 and home rest for two weeks following that. The personnel team has not found anyone to take on the role in Lynn's absence. Clarissa suggested breaking the tasks down and asking for several volunteers
- Year end bonuses. Clarissa moved that the Personnel team be given \$1000 to consider and distribute between our three employees and Elizabeth Anne be offered a stipend as Choir director.
- The team recommends an increase approved last month, be increased to take 6% COLA into account. Dana shared that the Finance team had factored in a 6% COLA increase. The amended recommendation was approved.

Congregational Life – Bobbie suggested Name tags and visitor cards for the pews. This was agreed.

- Mission—Joy Offering is scheduled on 12/19. The team is preparing for the end of Year Mission distribution. They want to consider an offering for KY disaster relief. The mission team has a line item of \$2500 for donations. Clarissa identified that the budget reports indicate we will have ~\$10,000 surplus at the end of the year. Mike moved that an additional \$5000 be allotted for the Mission team to distribute a total of \$7500 at the end of the year. John seconded the motion and the motion passed.
- **Communications** –Dana reported that Charles has recommended a backup power supply for the AV. The team was encouraged to identify the cost and submit a request.

Worship – a meeting is planned 12/20.

New Business - Setting a date for the examination, ordination and installation of Elders. – Jan 9 after worship for the examination and Jan 16 for ordination and installation.


Presbyterian Women
