One of the earliest memories I have of Sunday School is Easter Sunday.



Her brother had taught her how to box, and she'd practice on you if she wanted to. Anyway, we where told to return to the picnic shelter for the counting. What can you get for a nickel? Not much! However, if all Presbyterians give 5¢/meal, it can do a lot.

The Hunger Ministry of Presbytery of the James (POJ) (which we are part of) invites you to give 5¢for each meal you enjoy to relieve hunger locally and globally.

In 2020 our combined congregations in POJ contributed \$48,037 to the Hunger Ministry through the Five Cents a Meal program. This was down \$20,000 from 2018.

This is where your contribution goes:

- -Church emergency food banks
- -School backpack programs...including Madison Presbyterian Loaves & Fishes
- -County food pantries
- -Supports efforts to eliminate the causes of hunger, such as agricultural training so that recipients can become self sufficient
- -A small portion of the funds support advocacy groups
- -Bread for the World, a faith based network which campaigns nationally for policy changes
- -Virginia Hunger Solutions which works to improve food security though state programs and improved policies.

The Loaves and Fishes program that our Church is involved with has been a recipient of several food grants from the Hunger Ministry. As we have all heard from multiple sources, food insecurity is a great problem in our country today. I would like to challenge you to once again **contribute to the 5¢ a meal offering on the first Sunday of each month.** 

Let's help bring those dollar amounts up and feed God's children.

# **Update from the Building and Grounds Team**

The Building portion of the team has had no major problems in a while. The purchase of an HVAC maintenance contract has been most helpful by having someone available if problems arise. There have been no problems with the alarm system since a wire was replaced from the control panel to a main pull station. We are still waiting to have the temporary wire run through the attic and connected. The smoke detectors in the Fellowship Hall will be replaced when the wire is re-run. All the fire extinguishers were checked and certified in February.

The Grounds portion of the team began as a group of over a dozen mowers. Now that Lee and Pattie Rees' son, Carter is doing the mowing with help from Bill Patty, the grounds team members have more time for pruning and clean up.

In March we do our annual pruning and take advantage of the offer by the Madison transfer station to bring brush at no charge.

Saturday April 9<sup>th</sup> will be our annual Family Mulching Morning. We begin at 9:00 and will need volunteers to bring mulch as well as to spread it. The rain date will be April 23<sup>rd</sup>.

We bring our own tools, gloves, pickups, trailers, wheel barrows; whatever you might use at home.
