

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It seems all over the world we have War. We have had war before. We will have war again, I suppose, if Jesus doesn't come first. It's a very hard time to hold the center of our faith: Love God with all your heart and soul and strength, and love your neighbor as yourself. All of them.

The side we choose is Jesus. It's a hard place to stand, with our hearts breaking and our dander up. But it's the side that bore the spears for all of humanity. We can say with absolute certainty that babies shouldn't be killed and women shouldn't be raped and hospitals shouldn't be bombed. We can also say with absolute certainty that this has been going on for a long, long time. Open your Bible, and see.

The Presbyterian Church (USA) has been deliberately involved in working for peace in the middle east through Peacemaking initiatives and the group Presbyterians for Middle East Peace. I am certain that Peacemaking efforts will continue.

What can we do? First, get educated. The place for us to be is at the side of Jesus, who says "Put up your sword". To become well versed in the full history of the middle east — especially since the time of British Colonialization. Read deep and wide.

And truly, we need to appreciate the conviction of "Whose Land is it Anyway?" I urge you to take the brave and bold look at "whose land" we ourselves are on. It is deeply uncomfortable. No, you didn't *personally* take land from the Native Americans. Defensiveness is what we feel when we get in trouble, and our first instinct is to say "not my fault".

There is an interactive land map (https://native-land.ca/) where you can enter your address and see who used to live where you are. And I don't mean who had the deed before you did. I entered the church's address. This land was the land of the Monacan, the Shawandasse Tula ("Shawnee"), and the Manahoac. I know nothing about these peoples. I'm going to start reading.

And this – scripture, history, and finding out about our own backyard should put each of us in a place of humility, as befits disciples who continue to learn all their lives.

What can we do? Become educated, work for peace in the way we conduct our lives in a fraught time, support the Presbyterian Peacemaking Offering, the Presbyterian Disaster Response for humanitarian aid (https://pma.pcusa.org/donate/make-a-gift/gift-info/DR000081/), and pray. Perhaps this Prayer for Peace in the Middle East from the National Interreligious Leadership Initiative For Peace in the Middle East will help get you started:

Sustain together in undiminished hope, O God of hope, those who continue to labor with undiminished determination to build peace in the land from which, of old, out of brokenness, violence and destruction, nevertheless hope emerged for so many of faith. . . . Bless all the spiritual seed of Abraham together with the light of your Presence.

For in the light of your Presence we have found a way of justice and mercy and a vision of Peace.

We praise you O God, Giver of Peace,

Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times in every way. The Lord be with you all. (2 Thessalonians 3:16)



DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IS ENDING SOON



It's almost that time again to change your clocks for daylight saving time. (Or if you're stubborn and never change the time on your older devices, the good news is the clocks are about to be correct again!)

Every March and November we go through the daylight saving time tradition, at least in most states. It signifies the changing of the seasons, an adjustment to your sleep schedule and also a reminder to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detector.

When does the time change?

Daylight saving time ends at 2 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 5.

Our days will keep getting shorter from here, until the shortest day of the year, December 21.

When did daylight saving time start in the United States

DST started in the U.S. with the Standard Time Act of 1918, a wartime measure for seven months during World War I to add more daylight hours to conserve energy resources. Year-round DST, or "War Time," was implemented again during World War II.

The Uniform Time Act of 1966 established a system of uniform daylight saving time throughout the nation, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Do we gain an hour when the time changes?

Yep! We gain an hour this time. Remember, spring forward and fall back.

When is daylight saving time going to start in 2024?

Daylight saving time starts again at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 10.

When does daylight saving time end permanently?

There's been more talk in recent years of doing away with daylight saving time and clock changes. Florida Rep. Sen. Marco Rubio's Sunshine Protection Act of 2021 proposed an end to the practice. However, there's nothing definitive to stop daylight saving time so we'll have to keep changing our clocks until any future change.

Federal law does allow states to pass laws that exempt themselves from daylight saving time, but does not allow states to permanently observe daylight saving time, the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCSL) says.

"Almost all of the states have considered legislation over the last several years that would place the state permanently on either standard time or daylight saving time," the NCSL says. "Since 2015, at least 450 bills and resolutions have been introduced in virtually every state, but none of significance passed until 2018, when Florida became the first state to enact legislation to permanently observe DST, pending amendment of federal law to permit such action."

Arizona and Hawaii, plus the U.S. territories of American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, do not observe daylight saving time. Standard time, which typically runs between November and March nationwide, is observed year-round in these states and territories.

Since there has been no movement on federal legislation ending the nationwide practice of changing the clocks twice a year, everyone outside of those states and territories should expect the clock changes to continue into 2024.











Reformation Sunday at the Kirk!

Please join me each first Sunday to offer what we can to help feed the hungry here and across the world.



Sixty-five million adults in the U.S. have dropped out of active church attendance and about 2.7 million more are leaving every year. Faith After Doubt is for the millions of people around the world who feel that their faith is falling apart.

Using his own story and the stories of a diverse group of struggling believers, Brian D. McLaren, a former pastor and now an author, speaker, and activist shows how old assumptions are being challenged in nearly every area of human life, not just theology and spirituality. He proposes a four-stage model of faith development in which questions and doubt are not the enemy of faith, but rather a portal to a more mature and fruitful kind of faith. The four stages—Simplicity, Complexity, Perplexity, and Harmony—offer a path forward that can help sincere and thoughtful people leave behind unnecessary baggage

and intensify their commitment to what matters most.

PRAY FOR THE FIREFIGHTERS BATTLING THE QUAKER RUN WILDFIRE



More than 100 firefighters and other workers are on the scene at the Quaker Run wildfire in Madison County near Shenandoah National Park working to contain the still-growing blaze.

Local emergency management staff thanked Madison County residents for their support as crews battle the blaze.



Financial Aid

Last year, we created the Hoover Ridge Scholarship Fund to allow families facing any type of hardship the ability to have some or all of their child's program fees covered. In most cases, a parent or guardian can pay some of the fees, but not all, or some have multiple children playing sports and cannot afford to pay fees for all of them. This program allows for parents/guardians to choose a contribution level (if any), even if they do not receive benefits through Social Services.
